ENGINEERING:

The City of Bunnell has selected TLC Diversified Inc. as a general contractor for the construction of the Ion Exchange System at the Water Treatment Plant (WTP). Notice to Proceed was issued on July 7th and the contractor has 365 days to complete all construction activities. The groundbreaking ceremony is scheduled for August 11th at 6:30pm at the WTP located at 100 Utility Drive in Bunnell, FL.

WHAT'S NEW:

The City of Bunnell has purchased a new City Hall: Heritage Charter School, located at 201 West Moody Blvd. The one block facility will become the new City Hall and Municipal Campus housing the City's staff, the Police Department and the City's meeting facility. The retrofit of the facility is expected to begin the week of July 28th, 2014 and most staff should be occupying the facility by September 1st, 2014. IN THE INTERIM:

While the new facility is being retrofitted City Administration, Clerk, Finance, and Utility Billing Departments will be moved to the Atlantis Business Park located at 2323 North State St, Unit 60 effective August 1st, 2014. FIRE DEPARTMENT:

Lightening Awareness

Now we are in our summer thunderstorm season and Florida ranks as the deadliest lightning state in the United States of America. In Flagler County we have had several lightning related injuries over the years, but we have never recorded a lightning related fatality since records have been kept. You can help us keep it that way by remembering these thunderstorm and lightning safety rules.

Lightning: What You Need to Know

NO PLACE outside is safe when thunderstorms are in the area!!

If you hear thunder, lightning is close enough to strike you.

When you hear thunder, immediately move to safe shelter: a substantial building with electricity or plumbing or an enclosed, metal-topped vehicle with windows up.

Outdoor events should be suspended or ended when thunder is heard.

Stay in safe shelter at least 30 minutes after you hear the last sound of thunder.

Indoor Lightning Safety

Stay off corded phones, computers and other electrical equipment that put you in direct contact with electricity.

Avoid plumbing, including sinks, baths and faucets.

Stay away from windows and doors, and stay off porches.

Do not lie on concrete floors, and do not lean against concrete walls.

Last Resort Outdoor Risk Reduction Tips

If you are caught outside with no safe shelter anywhere nearby the following actions may reduce your risk:

Immediately get off elevated areas such as hills, mountain ridges or peaks

Never lie flat on the ground

Never shelter under an isolated tree

Never use a cliff or rocky overhang for shelter

Immediately get out and away from ponds, lakes and other bodies of water

Stay away from objects that conduct electricity (barbed wire fences, power lines, windmills, etc.)

Lightning Myths and Facts

MYTH Lightning never strikes twice in the same place.

FACT Lightning can strike multiple times in the same place.

MYTH Rubber tires protect you from lightning.

FACT It is the metal of the vehicle conducts the charge around you. Motorcycles and golf carts offer no protection from lightning.

MYTH A small wooden canopy will protect from lightning.

FACT Small shacks offer no protection.

MYTH When it is not raining, it is safe to be outside even through thunder is heard.

FACT If you can hear thunder, you are in range of lightning

Lightning Safety & Awareness ***When Thunder Roars...Go Indoors!***

Fact: As soon as thunder is heard, you are at risk of being struck by lightning, & ALL thunderstorms produce lightning.

Locate a safe, substantial building should a thunderstorm approach your location (the building should be grounded with wiring and plumbing).

Act quickly when thunder is heard and/or tall, building cumulus clouds (puffy white clouds) approach. Go to your safe shelter.

Stay inside your lightning shelter until at least 30 minutes after the last rumble of thunder before resuming outdoor activities.

Help lightning strike victims quickly (they DO NOT carry electrical charge). Call for medical help immediately, and initiate CPR if the victims heart or breathing stops.

U.S. Lightning Strike Statistics

- Since 2006, 64 percent lightning deaths occurred during leisure activities.
- Around 80% of the lightning fatalities were male.

- Scan the Sky
